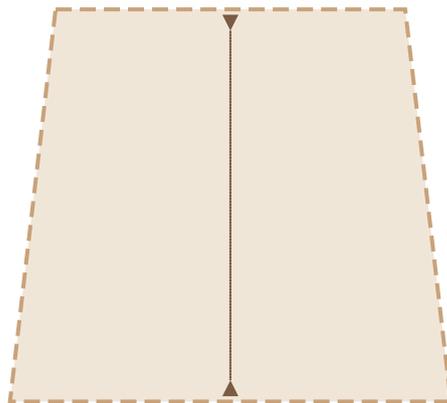


# Free Patchwork Apron Pattern

**Seam allowance already included:** Cut along the DASHED line. Sew 1/2 in (1.3 cm) inside that line.

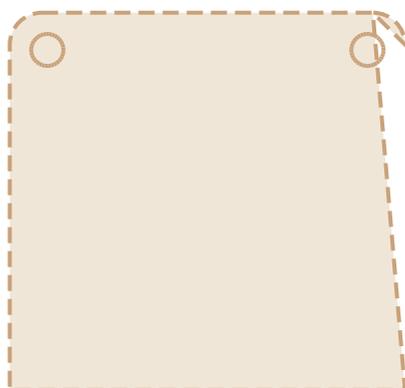


## Measurements

Top width	18 in (46 cm)
Bottom width	22 in (56 cm)
Length	24 in (61 cm)
Shape	Gently flared

### Beginner tip

The body is wider at the bottom than the top — this gives the apron a flattering flare. Just cut 2 in extra from each bottom corner and taper up to the top width.



## Measurements

Width	11 in (28 cm)
Height	10 in (25 cm)
Top corners	Round them slightly
Closure	2 buttons or D-rings

### Beginner tip

The bib buttons onto the apron body at the shoulders — that is what the two silver buttons do in the photo. Use a D-ring instead for an adjustable neck strap.

**Seam allowance already included:** Cut along the DASHED line. Sew 1/2 in (1.3 cm) inside that line.



*Dashed line = hem fold*

## Measurements

Width	<b>6 in (15 cm)</b>
Height	<b>5 in (13 cm)</b>
Top hem	<b>Fold 1 in down, then stitch</b>
Placement	<b>Lower third of apron front</b>

### Beginner tip

Pick two contrasting scrap fabrics for the pockets — one floral and one solid looks great, just like in the photo! Hem the top edge first, then topstitch the whole pocket onto the apron.

*Neck loop x1*

## Measurements

Waist ties (x2)	<b>36 x 2 in (91 x 5 cm) each</b>
Neck loop (x1)	<b>24 x 2 in (61 x 5 cm)</b>
How to sew	<b>Fold in half lengthwise, press, stitch</b>
Adjustable Thread	<b>Thread neck loop through a D-ring</b>

### Beginner tip

Fold each strip in half the long way, press with your iron, then sew along the open edge. Turn it right side out for a neat tube. An iron is your best friend for crisp straps!

## How to Make Your Own Paper Pattern

You don't need to buy a pattern — just trace your own at home in a few minutes.

- 1 Gather your supplies**  
You need: large sheets of paper (tape printer paper together, or use kraft paper or newspaper), a pencil, a ruler or measuring tape, and scissors.
- 2 Draw each piece**  
Using the measurements on pages 1 and 2, draw each pattern piece as a rectangle first. Then trim where needed — round the bib top corners and flare the apron body bottom.
- 3 Seam allowance is already included**  
The measurements in this sheet already include 1/2 in seam allowance. So just cut right on the line you draw — no need to add anything extra.
- 4 Cut and check the fit**  
Cut out your paper pieces and hold them up to your body (or against an apron you already own). Adjust the length or width if needed before cutting into your actual fabric.
- 5 Transfer to card stock**  
Once you are happy with the fit, trace each piece onto card stock or a manila folder. Label each one (Apron Body, Bib, Pocket) with the measurements so you can reuse them.
- 6 Cut your fabric**  
Pin each paper pattern onto your patchwork panel or lining fabric and cut around the edges. For the straps, just cut fabric strips directly — no paper pattern needed.

### Legend

-  = Cut line (1/2 in seam allowance already included)
-  = Fold or hem guide line (do NOT cut here)

### Pro tip: Save your pattern forever!

Once your paper pattern fits perfectly, trace it onto freezer paper. You can iron freezer paper directly onto fabric for a crisp, accurate cut line every time — and your pattern will last for years.
